

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






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#### Rough, but spirited season!

#### ACT V. SAT

#### Which test suits you?

Wondering or trying to debate on which test to take? Well, here are a few comparisons for you to help you make up your mind.

The ACT is a content-based test, consisting of a 45 minute English section; a 60 minute Math section; a 35 minute Reading section, and an optional 40 minute essay for the writing section.

Whereas the SAT is a reasoning-based test, consisting of 2, 25 minute Critical reading sections and 1, 20-min section; Math: 2, 25-min sections and 1, 20-min section; Writing: 1, 25-min essay, 1, 25-min section, and 1, 10-min section. The ACT questions are often easier to understand on a first read. On the SAT, you may need to spend time figuring out what you're being asked before you can start solving problems.

The SAT has a stronger emphasis on vocabulary.

If you're a word-genius then you'll love the SAT, if words aren't your thing, maybe you'll do better on the ACT.

The ACT has a science section, whereas the SAT does not.

You don't have to really know much about how chemical bonds work; it's more of just logical reasoning.

The ACT tests more advanced math concepts.

The SAT is broken up into more sections.

The writing test for the ACT is optional but required at most colleges.

The ACT is more of a "big picture" test.

Colleges don't look at your separate scores for each section on the ACT, but they sure do on the SAT.
